Forewords & Overview

Executive Summary

The 2026 Youth4Nature Conference, held on 13–14 June 2026 in Arusha, Tanzania, brought together young conservation leaders, government representatives, conservation practitioners, academics, development partners, the private sector, and community organizations to advance youth participation in biodiversity conservation and sustainable development.

Building on the success of previous editions, the conference provided a dynamic platform for learning, networking, innovation, and collaboration.

Through keynote presentations, panel discussions, Kitimoto Talks, technical workshops and networking sessions, participants explored practical solutions to today's conservation challenges while strengthening partnerships for future action.

The conference reaffirmed that young people are not only the future of conservation but active leaders shaping solutions today. Participants left with new knowledge, expanded professional networks, practical skills, and renewed commitment to safeguarding Tanzania's natural heritage.

Conference at a Glance

The **2026 Youth4Nature Conference** was held on **13–14 June 2026** at the **United World College (UWC), Arusha, Tanzania**. Building on the success of the previous editions in 2022 and 2024, the conference brought together young conservation leaders, researchers, practitioners, policymakers, development partners, community organizations, and private sector representatives to exchange knowledge, strengthen partnerships, and inspire the next generation of environmental leaders.

Over two days, participants explored innovative ideas, practical conservation solutions, emerging technologies, and career opportunities through a diverse programme of interactive sessions and networking activities.

The 2026 conference programme was organized around four interconnected themes that reflected current priorities in biodiversity conservation and youth engagement:

Building a Future in Conservation

Exploring conservation careers, leadership journeys, and opportunities for professional growth.

Conservation in Practice (Land & Marine)

Showcasing practical conservation solutions, community-led initiatives, habitat restoration, and marine conservation.

Next-Generation Technology in Conservation

Demonstrating the role of artificial intelligence, satellite monitoring, data analytics, and other emerging technologies in conservation.

Digital Voices for Nature

Highlighting how storytelling, photography, documentaries, content creation, and social media are transforming conservation communication.

A Platform for the Next Generation

The 2026 Youth4Nature Conference served as more than a learning event—it was a platform for collaboration, mentorship, innovation, and professional networking.

By bringing together young conservationists and experienced practitioners from across different sectors, the conference strengthened partnerships, expanded knowledge, and empowered participants to become active leaders in protecting Tanzania's biodiversity and advancing sustainable conservation efforts.





The Conference

Introduction

Young people are increasingly at the forefront of addressing today's environmental and conservation challenges. As biodiversity loss, climate change, wildlife crime, and ecosystem degradation continue to threaten ecosystems, livelihoods, and natural resources, investing in the next generation of conservation leaders has never been more important.

The Youth4Nature Conference was established to create a national platform where young people can learn, connect, and contribute meaningfully to biodiversity conservation. Through knowledge sharing, networking, mentorship, and collaboration, the conference empowers youth with the skills, confidence, and opportunities needed to become active leaders within the conservation sector.

The conference traces its origins to the **African Protected Area Congress (APAC)** held in Kigali, Rwanda, in July 2022. Inspired by the passion and commitment

of Tanzanian conservationists who participated in APAC, Youth4Nature was envisioned as a space where diverse young minds could exchange ideas, share experiences, develop practical skills, and explore career pathways in conservation.

Since the inaugural conference in **2022**, followed by the successful second edition in **2024**, Youth4Nature has continued to grow as one of Tanzania's leading platforms for youth engagement in conservation. The **2026 conference** marked the third edition, further strengthening a growing network of young conservation champions from across Tanzania and beyond.

More than a conference, Youth4Nature has become a movement that connects emerging conservation leaders with experienced practitioners, researchers, policymakers, development partners, and community organizations, creating opportunities for lasting partnerships and collective action.



Conference Objectives

The Youth4Nature Conference was organized to inspire and empower young people to actively participate in biodiversity conservation by strengthening their knowledge, leadership capacity, professional networks, and practical skills.

Specifically, the conference aimed to:

- ✧ Inspire young people to pursue careers and leadership opportunities within the conservation sector.
- ✧ Increase awareness of career pathways, funding opportunities, research, entrepreneurship, and emerging technologies supporting conservation.
- ✧ Create opportunities for meaningful engagement between young conservationists and experienced professionals from government institutions, conservation organizations, academia, development partners, and the private sector.
- ✧ Strengthen participants' capacity through knowledge sharing, mentorship, and practical learning experiences.
- ✧ Promote collaboration, innovation, and partnerships that contribute to biodiversity conservation and sustainable development.
- ✧ Showcase youth-led conservation initiatives while encouraging participants to become active contributors to environmental protection within their communities.

Through these objectives, the conference sought to strengthen youth participation in conservation while building a community of future leaders capable of addressing Tanzania's environmental challenges through collaboration, innovation, and shared learning.



Conference Themes

The 2026 Youth4Nature Conference programme was built around four thematic areas that reflected current priorities in conservation while responding to the interests, aspirations, and professional development needs of young conservation leaders.

Together, these themes created opportunities for participants to explore conservation from multiple perspectives, combining technical knowledge, practical experience, innovation, leadership, and communication.

When youth lead with purpose, communities thrive, ecosystems recover, and sustainable futures become possible for everyone.

Building a Future in Conservation

This theme focused on career development by connecting participants with experienced conservation leaders, CEOs, and professionals. Through inspiring discussions, they explored career pathways, strengthened professional networks, and gained practical insights to build meaningful careers that contribute to biodiversity conservation and a sustainable future.

Conservation in Practice (Land & Marine)

This theme showcased practical conservation initiatives across Tanzania through real-world case studies and field experiences. Participants explored community-led conservation, habitat restoration, biodiversity monitoring, marine protection, and human-wildlife coexistence, learning how partnerships between communities, conservation organizations, researchers, and government create lasting conservation impact.

Next-Generation Technology in Conservation

Participants explored how emerging technologies are transforming conservation through artificial intelligence, drones, satellite monitoring, GIS, remote sensing, digital mapping, and data analytics. Sessions highlighted how innovation supports biodiversity protection while emphasizing the ethical, responsible, and inclusive use of technology for sustainable conservation outcomes.

Opening Ceremony

The 2026 Youth4Nature Conference officially commenced on 13 June 2026 at the United World College (UWC), Arusha, bringing together young conservation leaders, practitioners, researchers, policymakers, development partners, community representatives, and private sector actors from across Tanzania and neighboring countries.



The opening ceremony marked the beginning of two days of learning, dialogue, innovation, and collaboration. It established the conference's vision by encouraging participants to actively engage throughout the programme, build meaningful professional networks, and take full advantage of the opportunities presented by the diverse range of sessions and speakers.

The opening session was facilitated by **Ellen Mndima from Maliasili**, who welcomed participants and provided an overview of the conference programme, objectives, and expectations for the two-day event. Participants were introduced to the structure of the conference, session formats, and the various opportunities available for learning, networking, and collaboration.

This was followed by an interactive session led by **Jestina Kimbesa**, who shared practical guidance on how participants could maximize their conference experience. Her session encouraged delegates to actively participate in discussions, engage with speakers, connect with fellow participants, and build professional relationships that would extend beyond the conference.



The conference's first keynote presentation was delivered by **Sam Shaba, Chief Executive Officer** of Honeyguide Foundation, who opened the technical programme with a presentation titled "Reimagining Conservation Through Emerging Technology." His presentation explored how technological innovation is reshaping conservation practice, highlighting the opportunities presented by digital tools while emphasizing the importance of responsible and ethical application of emerging technologies to achieve meaningful conservation outcomes.

The opening programme concluded with a panel discussion on Conservation Leadership Journeys, moderated by **Dr. Thabang Teffo**. The discussion brought together distinguished conservation leaders representing different organizations and experiences within the sector.

Drawing from their personal leadership experiences, the panelists reflected on the challenges, opportunities, and lessons they have encountered throughout their conservation careers. They encouraged participants to embrace continuous learning, remain resilient in the face of challenges, and pursue leadership grounded in collaboration, innovation, and community engagement.

The opening ceremony successfully set the tone for the conference by inspiring participants to think beyond traditional approaches to conservation while reinforcing the important role that young people play in shaping the future of biodiversity conservation in Tanzania and across the region.

Conference Sessions

The conference programme was carefully designed to provide participants with a dynamic and interactive learning experience. Through a combination of keynote presentations, panel discussions, technical workshops, Campfire Sessions, Kitimoto Talks, Ignite Talks, Kijiweni Talks, networking activities, and exhibitions, participants were exposed to diverse perspectives, practical experiences, and innovative ideas that reflected the evolving landscape of biodiversity conservation.

Rather than focusing solely on presentations, the conference encouraged dialogue, peer learning, collaboration, and active participation.

Each session format was intentionally developed to create different learning experiences while allowing participants to interact directly with speakers, conservation practitioners, and fellow delegates.

Over the course of two days, the conference successfully delivered 62 sessions, providing approximately 42.45 hours of speaker-led discussions, practical learning, and knowledge exchange across the four conference themes.

Keynote Addresses

Keynote sessions featured distinguished conservation leaders who shared strategic insights on biodiversity, innovation, youth leadership, and conservation careers. Drawing from extensive experience, speakers encouraged participants to embrace collaboration, adaptive leadership, and bold thinking while recognizing young people as active contributors to shaping the future of conservation.



Panel Discussions

Panel discussions brought together experts from government, conservation organizations, academia, communities, and the private sector to explore today's conservation challenges. Through diverse perspectives and interactive dialogue, participants gained a deeper understanding of biodiversity issues while contributing questions, experiences, and ideas throughout each engaging discussion.



Campfire Sessions

Campfire Sessions created informal, highly interactive learning spaces where participants engaged directly with speakers through open discussions and practical knowledge sharing. The conversational format encouraged questions, collaboration, and deeper exploration of conservation topics while building meaningful connections and lasting relationships among participants and facilitators.



Wild Vision Sessions

Wild Vision Sessions showcased forward-thinking conservation approaches, innovative technologies, and practical solutions addressing biodiversity challenges. Through real-world examples and case studies, participants explored how collaboration, innovation, and evidence-based decision-making are shaping more effective conservation outcomes and inspiring future environmental action.



Ignite Talks

Ignite Talks featured short, energetic presentations showcasing innovative ideas, emerging research, and inspiring conservation stories. The fast-paced format challenged speakers to communicate clearly and concisely while exposing participants to diverse perspectives, fresh solutions, and experiences that sparked further conversations throughout the conference.



Kitimoto Talks

Known as "The Hot Seat," Kitimoto Talks encouraged honest, thought-provoking conversations on important conservation issues. Participants and speakers explored different viewpoints through respectful debate, promoting critical thinking, open dialogue, and a deeper understanding of complex environmental challenges facing conservation today.

Kijiweni Talks

Inspired by community conversations, Kijiweni Talks offered a relaxed space for participants to exchange experiences, share stories, and discuss ideas beyond the formal programme. The sessions encouraged peer learning, strengthened professional relationships, and inspired continued collaboration among young conservation leaders after the conference.



Networking Opportunities

Networking remained a defining feature of the conference, creating opportunities for participants to build professional relationships, exchange ideas, and connect with organizations offering mentorship, internships, research, scholarships, and employment. These interactions fostered lasting partnerships that extended well beyond the conference itself.



Technical Sessions

Technical workshops provided hands-on learning experiences across conservation leadership, communication, fundraising, technology, research, project development, and community engagement. Participants gained practical skills and knowledge that strengthened their ability to apply innovative approaches within their organizations, institutions, and communities.

Conference Outcomes

The 2026 Youth4Nature Conference successfully achieved its objective of empowering young people to become active contributors to biodiversity conservation by creating an inclusive platform for learning, collaboration, and professional development. Through two days of interactive discussions, practical learning, and networking, participants strengthened their knowledge, expanded their professional networks, and explored innovative approaches to addressing contemporary conservation challenges.

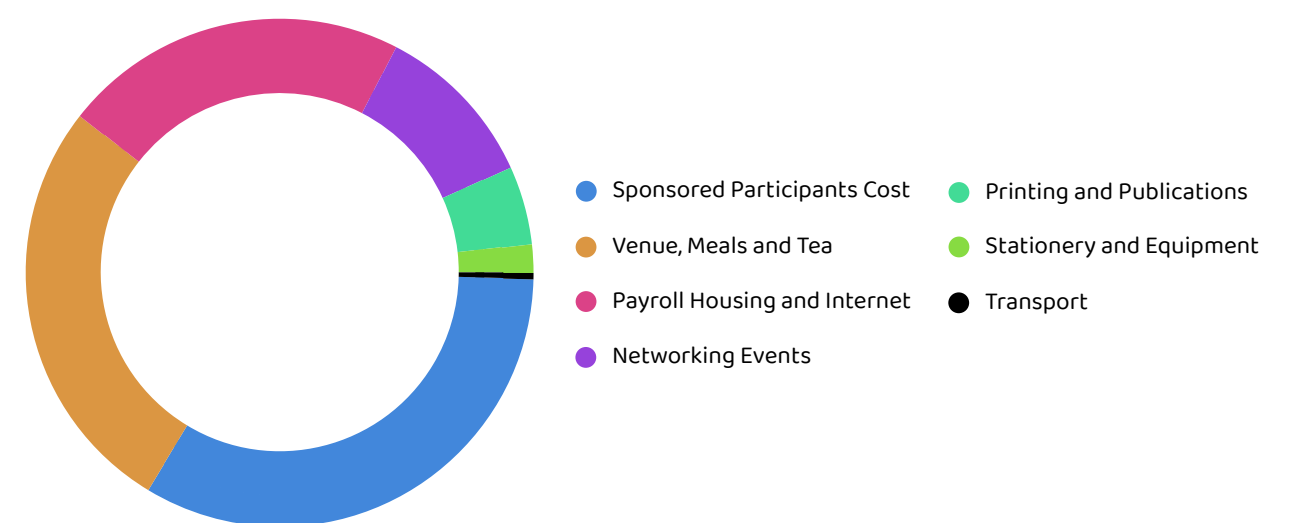
